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REPORT FROM THE 2023 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

It was a bright, sunny, optimistic day on April 16, 2023, and 36 intrepid members the York Pioneer and Historical Society met at the historic Montgomery's Inn to participate in the first inperson Annual General Meeting since January 26, 2020. One thousand, one hundred and seventy-six days had passed since we last met at John McKenzie House.

President Fred Robbins opened with a Land Acknowledgement, and some personal reminiscences; the Minutes of the last AGM were considered and approved; and the members heard a report from outgoing Treasurer Cindy Ewins with respect to the status of the audited financial statements, and conditionally approved draft statements of profit and loss to October 31, 2022.

The members had the benefit of written reports from the President Fred Robbins; Archivist Gerry Lee; Corresponding Secretary Edward Fenner, on behalf of Melisa Vella Singh; Membership Chair Angus Palmer; Kayoko Smith on Scadding Cabin activities; and Brent Cunningham with respect to publication of The Update, among others.

The members then heard a report from the Nominating Committee which presented a slate of candidates for the Board. Paul Litt acted as pro tem Chair, and George Duncan as pro tem Recorder.

The position of President was contested by Angus Palmer and Fred Robbins, and by secret ballot, Angus Palmer was elected as President for the 2023-2024 term.

Fred Robbins remains on the Board as Past President, and the members passed a motion thanking him for his contribution to the YPHS.

Newly elected members include Carolyn Collie, Treasurer; Alexander Coomes, Recording Secretary; Edward Fenner, Corresponding Secretary (social media); Archivist, Erin Baxter; Editorial, Bruce McCowan; and Program Chair Matthew Campbell. The new appointee to the Sharon Temple Museum Society is Glenn Bonnetta.

There is much that we must do in the coming year to ensure the York Pioneer and Historical Society grows and thrives.

Clearly our new Board has the energy and enthusiasm to build on the hard work and commitment of its predecessors.

MAKING THE MOST OF THE SCADDING CABIN -THE 2022 APPLE CROP

This article is a report on a recent apple picking adventure at the Cabin in October, 2022.

Those of us who love the cabin look forward to our time in it, but we don't always partake of all it has to offer. For the years that I have been visiting the cabin I have always had my eye on those lovely apples, hanging way up high, so in the Fall of 2022 I decided to explore what forage the cabin's bounty might be able to produce.

On October 11, 2022, Kayoko Smith, Beth Alaksa, and myself (aka "the Team") met up at the cabin on a beautiful, sunny Fall day, with a plan to pick Pippin apples at the cabin.

We started off gathering up the best lower lying fruit, i.e. apples that weren't in too bad shape which were lying on the ground. Then we advanced to a full-on, ladder-up, yankingtool-in-hand assault on the upper branches where there was still plenty of fruit available.

To encourage the apples to drop, we experimented with several approaches, but the ticket turned out to be an iron rod with a nice hook at the end. The rod was plenty strong definitely strong enough to jiggle the tree branches around to encourage the apples to drop off.

Beth very kindly supported the ladder while I held on to the closest tree branch for dear life, and Kayoko very kindly then picked up the apples that tumbled down to the ground (with a satisfying "smash"). Unfortunately, with this method there was damage to all of the tree-top apples, and the Team discussed how future similar harvests might avoid this result.

With the apples then picked, the next part of the project was making the apple butter.

The recipe recommended a simple wash and chop of all the fruit, leaving the skin, cores, pips, and stems intact (above right). According to the recipe, the pectin in the cores helps with jelling, and the flavour in the peels adds to the overall delicious-ness of the butter.

Before washing the apples, all of the damaged and bruised apple parts were removed. The fruit was then given a good wash and, now prepped and quartered, eventually made its way into my largest pot.

The initial cooking of the butter required a covered 20-minute simmer with apple cider vinegar and water to soften the apples, producing a frothy, chunky mush.

The next step was to run the apple mush mixture through a food mill, forcing the apple pulp into a bowl below and leaving the skin, pips, stems and cores in the mill for disposal (too bad there was no pig to feed!). The total volume of apple pulp was then measured. One third of a cup of white granulated sugar was added, 1/3 cup to each cup of pulp. The sweetened apple pulp was then poured back into the cooking pot with cinnamon, ground cloves, allspice, lemon zest and a pinch of salt. The sweetened and spiced pulp was then simmered for about 2 hours until thick, with plenty of stirring, and then ladled into sterilized jars.

8.5 pounds of apples produced approximately four 500 ml jars of butter. The Team then got to sample the result, which we all decided was delicious.


